

English Country Dance



English country dance consists primarily of the dances and music from England in the 1600's and 1700's. Also included are some early American dances from the Colonial and Revolutionary War eras. It is one of the dance forms from which modern contra and square dance are descended. If you've seen any of the various Jane Austen movies then you've seen examples of English country dancing. The **Central Illinois English Country Dancers** hold monthly dances. We also hold a Ball twice a year, in June and December. All dances are taught and then danced to live music. Partners, costumes and experience are not required. **To protect the dance floor we ask that everyone bring a pair of clean leather-soled dance shoes or tennis shoes to change into.** Newcomers and all lovers of English country dance and music are welcome.
